



Greetings from Link,

It is now half way through the year and time to reflect on our achievements so far in 2016, and what we hope to achieve in the next six months. This newsletter will update you, as one of our kind supporters, on what we have been up to recently.

GEC Midline Results

We are delighted to announce the results of our DfID funded Girls' Education Challenge (GEC) midline findings.

The GEC project aims to improve girls' enrolment, retention and performance in four rural districts of the Wolaita Zone in south-western Ethiopia, working with 62,777 girls who are at risk of being marginalised.



We are thrilled to share that all of our midline results showed that the project is on track or has exceeded targets in all the key intervention areas. Some of the highlights include:

- Girls' attendance has improved
- Girls' self-confidence has improved 'substantially'
- Girls' literacy and numeracy improvement has far surpassed targets and control group scores
- The gap between boys and girls in core subjects has decreased, with girls showing an increased interest in science.

Improved Girls' Learning in Rural Wolaita is a Girls' Education Challenge project based in south-western Ethiopia. The interventions undertaken are aligned to Ministry of Education policy and are being implemented in partnership with the government offices at various levels.

The midline report shows that girls rate the following interventions as the most effective:



Girls' clubs



Tutorial classes



**Reusable sanitary pads,
underwear & soap**



Upgraded latrines



Gender responsive pedagogy



Awards



**Guidance & counselling for
improved self-esteem**

Uganda Receives Trust Africa Grant

Link Community Development Uganda is pleased to share the news that they will receive a second grant from Trust Africa. The grant is to support phase two of the Lugungu and School Support Initiative in Buliisa (LaSSIB-2).

The new grant will enable Link Uganda to enhance the management and functionality of schools using our innovative School Performance Review (SPR) process and the Early Grade Reading Assessment (EGRA). This project also aims to raise awareness of the value of reading among the wider school communities in Buliisa District.



LaSSIB-2 strongly supports the Ugandan Ministry of Education, Science, Technology and Sports (MoESTS) initiative to teach in the learner's mother-tongue (in this case Lugungu) and to use school data to improve learner performance and procedure. Link Uganda's project will target early grade learners and teachers, school management committees (including PTAs), head teachers and parents in the eight beneficiary schools of the program.

Link's work in Ethiopia featured in The Scotsman

Link was delighted to see our great work featured in The Scotsman newspaper on 21 June 2016.

The piece highlighted our efforts that 'give hope of an education to 62,000 Ethiopian girls'. In 2016, boys are still more likely to be sent to school in Ethiopia, with their sisters expected to take on key roles in the home - such as looking after sick parents or caring for siblings. We hope that this article will help raise awareness of our work, allowing more girls to be reached.

International Programme Director, Dr Samantha Ross, said on Link's work: "We are seeing an attitude change in communities... people are now saying they want girls to have an equal opportunity to the boys".
